



Adventures of Huckleberry Finn

Huck tells his own story in his own voice — informal, ungrammatical, and completely alive. Floating down the Mississippi River on a raft with the runaway slave Jim, he faces one dangerous situation after another and thinks his way through each one. The dialect takes a little getting used to, but the first-person narration is vivid and the chapters are short enough to read one at a time.

What you'll practise

- First-person past simple narration throughout the whole novel
- American dialect and non-standard grammar as character voice
- River and rural American vocabulary (raft, steamboat, levee)
- Tap unfamiliar dialect words or place names to see their meaning

How to read it — free

Listen to the full narration while you read along — every word above your level is highlighted in time with the voice and explained on tap. No signup, nothing to install.
