Nietzsche's 1886 critique of European moral philosophy is one of the most stylistically distinctive works in the Western tradition. Even in translation, the aphoristic sections are dense and deliberately provocative — short bursts of argument that require re-reading, followed by longer philosophical passages that build intricate chains of reasoning. It rewards readers who enjoy wrestling with ideas as much as with language.

What you'll practise

- Aphoristic style: compressed arguments in one or two sentences
- Abstract philosophical vocabulary: morality, will, instinct, prejudice, value
- Rhetorical questions and the author's direct address to the reader
- Tap any philosophical term to see a plain definition before reading on
